Dear Mr. Gallagher:

On January 26, 2012, you had a meeting with the Department of Human Resources and the Fiscal Office to discuss the proposed change in your salary following the completion of an analysis of your job classification and job duties by an outside consultant, the Archer Company. At that time you were given the opportunity to present additional information regarding your job duties. After reviewing the information you provided and Archer's recommendation, your classification is Senior Clerk and your salary of \$33,987.20 commensurate with a forty hour workweek, 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday is effective February 26, 2012.

Races for vacancies could shuffle county officials

State Sen. Patrick A. Sweeney's bid for Cuyahoga County commissioner's seat with 17th District Rep. Dan Brady's run for Sweeney's seat on the Senate, creates a mild domino effect in state and local offices.

Three Democrats and one Republican are vying for the 17th District seat. Republican J. Matthew Rodgers of Cleveland will be unopposed, while Tony A. Cuda, a former Cleveland school board member, squares off against two Lakewood City Council members, Bryan Flannery and Nancy J. Roth, in the Democratic primary in May.

As a former school board member, Cuda, an international elections supervisor on leave from the State Department, said his experience in education gives him the edge. "Now that I know who is in the race, I feel I am the only candidate from Cleveland who has the most experience to address

important issues such as education," Cuda said.

Flannery and Roth could not be reached for comment after the filing deadline yesterday.

Brady was the only Democrat to file for the 23rd District Senate seat. He will face Republican candidate Andrew Flink, the only GOP member to file for the race, in the November general election.

"I think we are going to be in a good position to keep the seat for the Democratic Party," said Brady, who was surprised that he did not have a Democratic opponent.

"It certainly is not something that I anticipated when I announced and filed my candidacy," Brady said. "I didn't know until 5 p.m. (yesterday)."

Brady said he knows little about Flink, who could not be reached for comment yesterday.

Another opportunity for local officeholders to try to move to the top posts comes from State Sen. Jeffrey Johnson's entrance into the race for U.S. Congress. John-

son is one of the Democrats vying to replace Rep. Louis Stokes, the Shaker Heights Democrat, who is retiring. That puts Johnson's 21st District State Senate seat up for grabs.

East Cleveland City Councilman Nathaniel Martin and 8th District State Rep. C.J. Prentiss will contend in the primary for the seat.

"Decisions of other candidates have presented me with a tremendous opportunity to move from the Statehouse to the State Senate," Prentiss said.

Martin could not be reached.

Six Democrats and two Republicans will run in their respective partisan primaries for Prentiss' old seat in the Ohio House.

Among the surprises at yesterday's filing deadline was the decision of 11th District State Rep. Peter Lawson Jones to keep his seat. Jones had considered joining the contest to replace Stokes, and also thought about a move to the State Senate.

Instead, he will stay in the House—unopposed.

The sole Republican candidate for auditor is State Rep. Michael W. Wise of Chagrin Falls, the chief sponsor of the legislation that would turn control of Cleveland schools over to Mayor Michael R. White.

The most obscure office in the county has drawn the most candidates. Recorder O'Malley faces seven challengers. The former Cleveland councilman, who was appointed to the seat in February 1997, said someone is trying to confuse voters.

"It seems on the surface that someone is trying to subvert the democratic process and confuse people as to who is the real Pat O'Malley," the recorder said.

The other Pat O'Malley declined comment. Candidate Brian M. O'Malley could not be reached for comment.

The most obscure office in the county has drawn the most candidates. Recorder Patrick O'Malley faces seven challengers.

In addition to the O'Malleys, the recorder also faces a challenge from within the County Administration Building.

Christopher F. Hagan, a former employee of the recorder's office, is running. Hagan works for Auditor Russo, the former recorder who has feuded openly with O'Malley. Hagan is the brother of retiring Commissioner Timothy F. Hagan.

There is potential for another type of confusion in the recorder's primary. Brooklyn school board member Kathleen A. Coyne and Michelle M. Coyne of Lakewood are candidates as well.

Kathleen Coyne is the cousin of Brooklyn Mayor John Coyne and daughter of Brooklyn Councilman Thomas Coyne.

The other Democratic recorder's office candidates are Michael J. Gallagher, deputy administrator of the 8th District Ohio Court of Appeals, and Dominic C. Delandor of University Heights.

Unlike the mob scene on the other side of the aisle, the Republicans do not have a primary for recorder. Westlake Councilwoman Elizabeth Schmitspah is the only candidate.

Roundtable tries to block sales-tax hike

COLUMBUS — The Ohio Roundtable yesterday asked a court to stop the May 5 ballot proposal submitted by the General Assembly to add 1 cent to the state sales tax to fund schools.

The group filed suit in Franklin County Common Pleas Court seeking a preliminary injunction to prevent Secretary of State Rob Taft from including the tax hike on the ballot, said David Zanotti, president of the organization.

The ballot measure arises from a bill, passed by the House and Senate and signed into law by Gov. George V. Voinovich on Tuesday. It would raise about \$1.1 billion a year, half of which would be used for schools and half to reduce property taxes.

The proposal would increase the state sales tax from 5 to 6

cents on the dollar. The Ohio Supreme Court gave lawmakers one year, until March 24, to revamp the state's school funding system, although Ohio Attorney General Betty D. Montgomery has asked the court to push the deadline back until July 1. Montgomery also asked that the Supreme Court hear any challenges to the tax proposal.

"We anticipated this challenge," said Chris Davey, a Montgomery spokesman. "Our position was that the constitution was properly applied by the legislature."

But Zanotti said lawmakers violated the Ohio Constitution by passing a tax bill and directing it to be placed on the ballot. No legislature in the last 140 years has ever tried to pass a statute contingent upon voter approval, he said.

Legislators should have passed

a constitutional amendment to raise sales taxes and then placed that on the ballot, Zanotti said. But two such attempts failed to win enough votes in the legislature.

"We're concerned the voters of Ohio are being deceived," Zanotti said. "They believe the vote is binding... The vote is not binding."

Zanotti said the General Assembly could change the wording to increase the tax or to decrease school funding the day after the election without telling the public.

"Voters are only seeing half the deal," Zanotti said. "We're very upset about the process of this. It opens up a whole new area of law in the state of Ohio."

Zanotti said he hoped the court would hold a hearing as soon as next week.

Geauga County commissioner hopefuls face primary battles

CHARDON — Candidates for county commissioner will face primary battles in May.

Republican Commissioner Jan Novak of Middlefield faces a challenge from little-known Robert F. Roy of Burton. And Chester Township Trustee Patricia M. Mula, a Democrat, is running against former County Commissioner Richard C. Ford, although he may drop out of the race before the primary.

Democratic Party Chairman Paul Newman said Ford had indicated he would probably step aside. Ford, 71, who resigned as Democratic chairman in 1996 due to health problems, could not be reached for comment yesterday.

"I think Pat is an excellent candidate," Newman said. "She has all those years of being a township trustee, she knows what she is doing and she is not as confrontational as the incumbent."

On the Republican side, Novak has county GOP Chairman Gary Coberly's endorsement.

"She has done a tremendous job for the county and she has diligently looked out for the interests of the small county residents," Coberly said. "We believe she is an outstanding candidate and campaigner."

Novak, 54, said she is running on her experience as a commissioner and a former Middlefield mayor and Village Council member. She said the commissioners have a good geographic balance, with Bill Repke residing on the west side and Neil Hofstetter on the eastern end of the county.

Mula, 56, has served as a Chester Township trustee since 1990.

"I think the decision making of

the county commissioners has not been above board, and I think we need to bring checks and balances to that office," Mula said. "We haven't had a representative from Chester Township for many years, and we are the biggest township."

Roy, 52, a Burton Township Zoning Commission member, declined to comment about his campaign until he has prepared his positions. But he said he decided to file after seeing that no Republican was challenging Novak.

In other races, county Treasurer Christopher P. Hitchcock of South Russell has filed to complete the two years of the treasurer's unexpired term, and faces no opposition in the primary. Hitchcock recently replaced George "Tim" Taylor as county treasurer. He will be challenged in November by Democrat George Zifko-Baliga, who lost a bid in November for a Munson Township trustee seat.

"I think the critical thing is having business experience and investment experience, bringing

new management expertise to government," Hitchcock said. "That's why I wanted the job in the first place."

County Auditor Tracy A. Jamison and Common Pleas Judge H.F. Underlier Jr. are unopposed.

Rep. Diane V. Grendell, a Chester Township Republican, faces no opposition in the primary. In November, she will face Democrat Kathleen Johnson of Brantville in Trumbull County.

The only local issues on the May ballot are in Munson and Bainbridge townships.

Voters in Munson Township will face two continuing 1.5-mill levies to boost firefighters' pay and help operate the Fire Department, and also fund road resurfacing projects. Each 1.5-mill levy would generate \$202,600 a year and cost the owner of a \$100,000 house about \$45 a year.
